Treasurer's Report

SAFE has produced a surplus this year of \$33,534.74 compared to \$125,842.43 in 2022-2023. The income in 2022-23 was skewed due to a one off grant of \$99,000 from NSW Government

SAFE's fixed ongoing costs are cookie cut from year 2023 to year 2024, with the cost associated with running SAFE Haven (e.g. rent, strata, services, etc.) being exceedingly high. Although vet fees still make up the majority of animal related costs, through careful planning for basic vet work and comparing fees between vets for high cost surgeries, we managed to reduce vet costs overall. Supporters generously donated cat food in response to food appeals and the deal struck with Royal Canin, a pet food company have culminated in reduced spending for SAFE.

SAFE is now registered for GST with periodic benefits of refunds coming our way quarterly the effects of which show in our finances.

In formulating this report, I note that Anne McLean raised funds by organising raffles & the annual theatre event with Pymble Players. Also Bee Jones contributed by identifying and following up on the deal with Royal Canin and selling donated items and merchandise online.

The committee continues to balance present demands with future needs and develops strategies to help guide the organisation. We are always looking at how to use money and resources for the betterment of the animals in our care.

Sustained fundraising to bolster revenue is becoming increasingly vital and monthly deficits are becoming increasingly common. There will likely be a reduced amount of funds and/or loss rather than a surplus in coming year but we will continue to push forward to help as many animals as we can.

Our Volunteers are SAFEs heroes, you all make it happen. Many thanks to each and everyone of you for your care, time, compassion & contribution.



2024 Income Total: \$283,376.28



2024 Expenses Total: \$249,841.54


